MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE DISPARITIES

- 21% of AI/AN 18+ reported mental illness in the past year
- Al/AN children and Adolescents have the highest rates of major depressive episodes and rate of depression
- Suicide was second leading cause of death for ages 10-34
- Co-occurring mental illness and substance use 3x times the national average
- However, Mental Health Service Utilization is low:
 - Do you agree with that assumption?

 - What are some reasons in your communities?



CONNECTION TO THE JUSTICE SYSTEM

The rate of any mental illness amongst Jail populations is 36<u>%</u>

Intergenerational Trauma is at the root for Indigenous people


Responses to this Trauma leads to incarceration

 - Elders




HOW CAN CULTURE HEAL THROUGH A DIVIDED SYSTEM?
