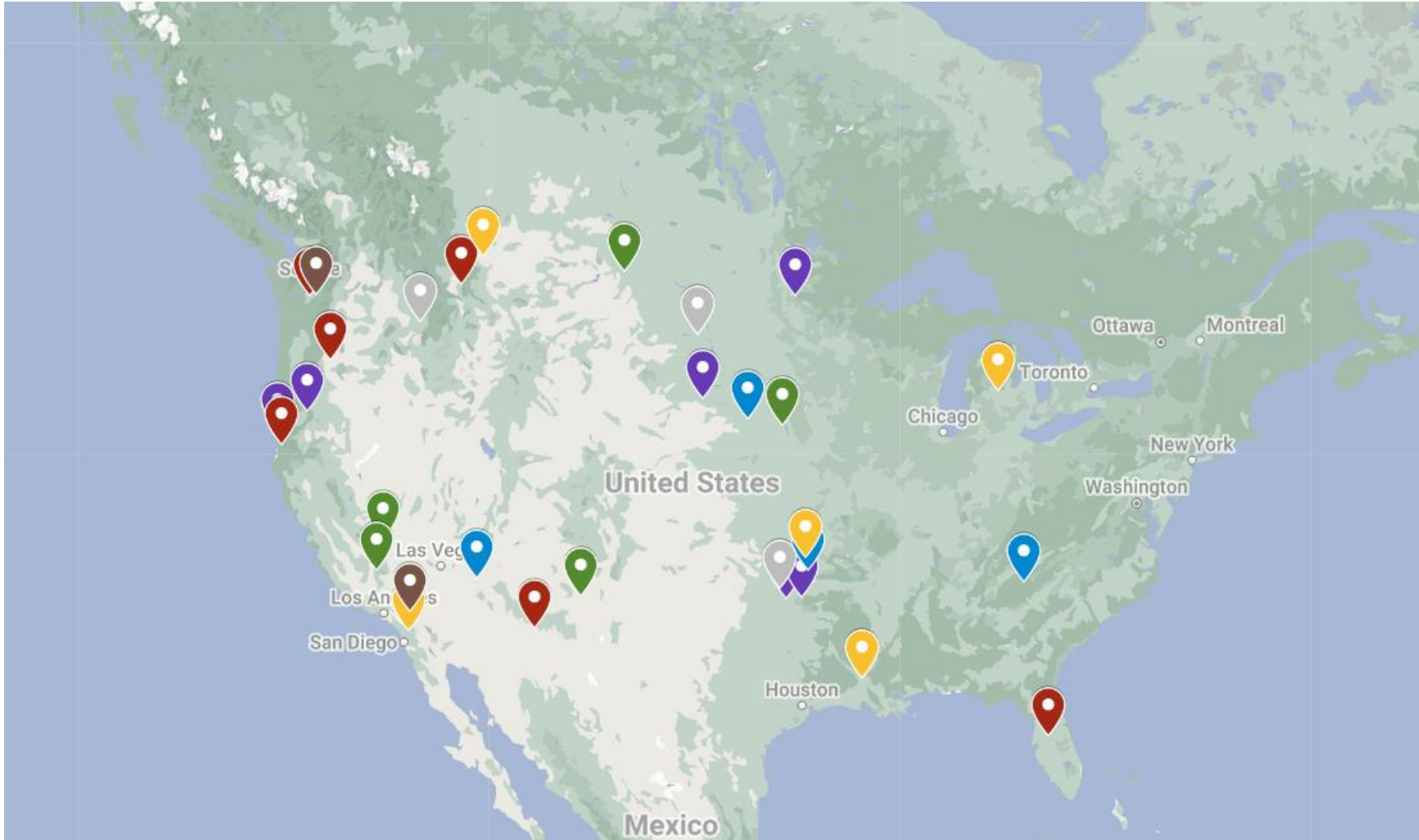
▶ PURPOSE

- Specialized courts that integrate an interdisciplinary and individualized service approach.
- Incorporation of elders, community members and culturally appropriate resources to promote individual healing, connection and/or reintegration into the tribal community.
- Consideration and implementation of the *Wellness Court Key Components*.
- Intervention and support for tribal youth.

JUVENILE HEALING TO WELLNESS COURTS TODAY

- OJJDP CTAS PA8 FY2021- 1st Cohort of both Enhancement Grantees (Continuing) and New Grantees.
- Across Regions funded and unfunded courts.
- General range of services ages 14-21 (See OJJDP Grant Guidelines and also recommendations under the Juvenile Drug Treatment Court Guidelines).
- Innovation and Collaborative Partnerships
- Transformative and Restorative Processes- Circle, Elders Panels, Youth/Peer Led Support and Integration of Services to Support Whole Wellness.
