## **INNOVATION AT ACOMA**

Innovation has been with Indigenous communities since time immemorial. Wherever our ancestors settled, they had to learn to live in the environments they chose. Blending old techniques with modern techniques is the way forward for us here at Acoma.







## INNOVATION AT SAGINAW CHIPPEWA TRIBE

**Tribal Youth Students** learned about Rain Gardens this summer. We hadn't had much rain, so one of our students watered the garden with a hose. We learned about the importance of rain gardens in our environment- to help collect storm water runoff & prevent it from flowing directly into lakes, rivers, and wetlands.





Students try 3D Printing Pens- exposure to making 3D objects. They made little people and cultural symbols like the medicine wheel and heart symbols.

Creating 3D book marks next. Another student working on Stem Kit- Salt Powered Robot.

### ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION STRATEGIES- CHIPPEWA RIVER CLEAN UP



Tribal Youth participated in a River Clean Up. They removed 5 garbage bags of trash from the river.

By removing trash and debris from the water, we are not only making it safer as recreational users, but improving the overall health of the river system and all of the wildlife that call the river and surrounding areas home.



Environmental waste and trash are hazardous to native birds, fish, and other wildlife directly harming habitats, releasing chemicals, and creating unsafe conditions for both humans and animals. Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. Pick up trash whenever you can. Collect bottles, glass, plastic, newspapers, and/or old books and take them to your local recycling facility. Learn to compost at home. KEEP OUR RIVERS CLEAN.






### INDIGENOUS ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION STRATEGIES AT ACOMA


- Lack of participation from Community (Parents, children, and leaders)
