- ❑ Research and support policies that enhance family connection e.g. transportation, education, and safe visiting rooms in jails/prisons.
- ❑ Divert justice-involved parents/primary caregivers, when possible

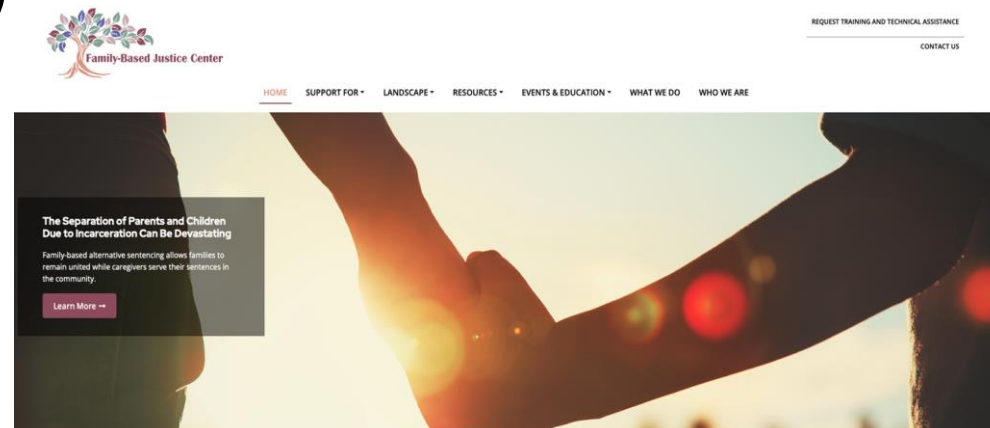

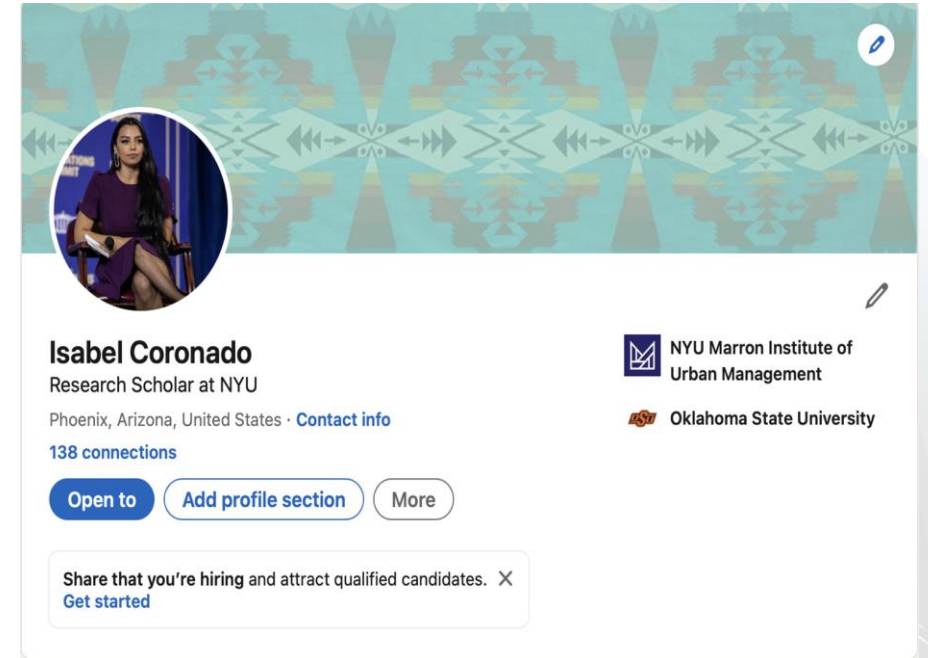
