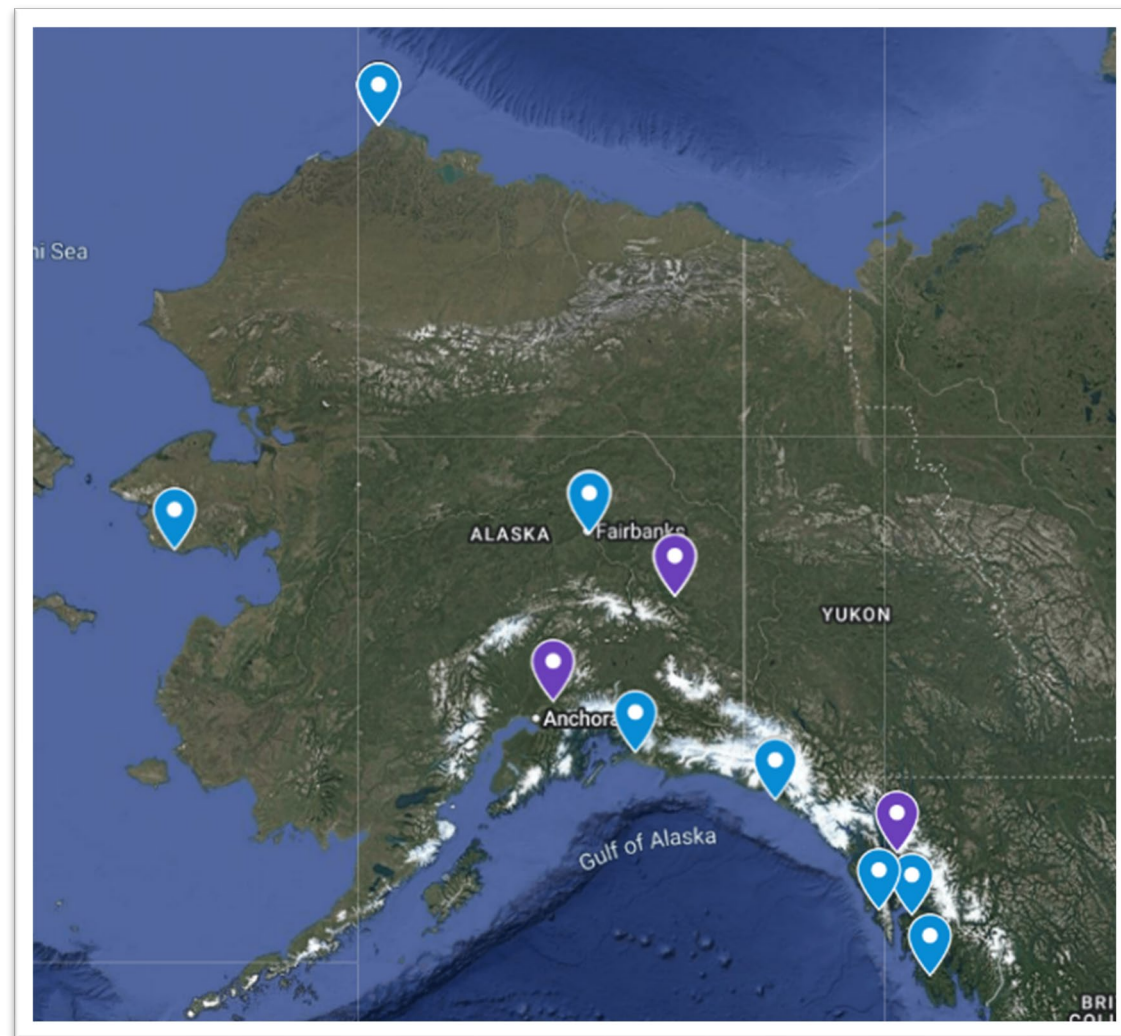

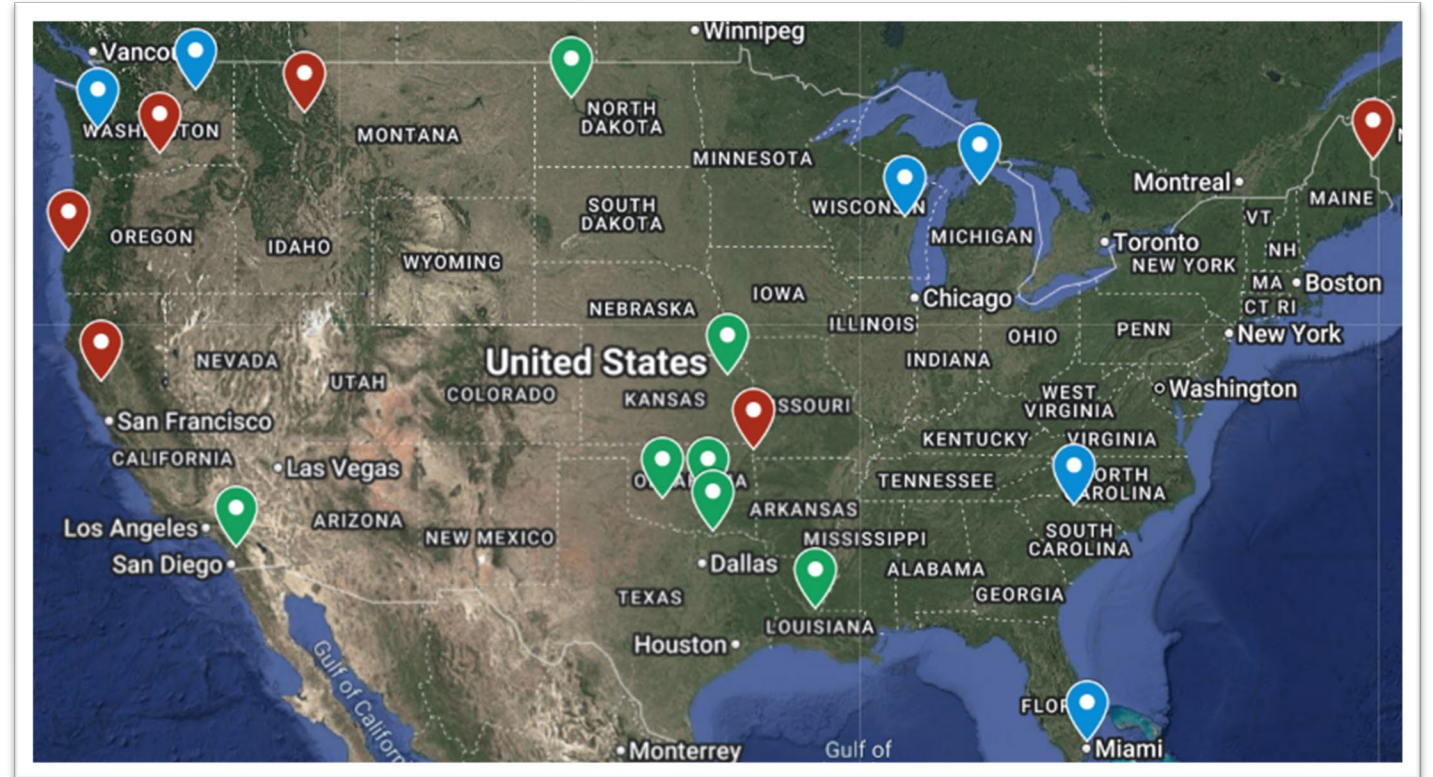

JustGrants is the system used to manage your grant award



- The system is where you will review grant documents, accept your award, complete and submit financial and programmatic reports, and request modifications when needed.

Just Grants users are assigned “roles” in the system by the person who was listed as Entity Administrator in your application



- The “roles” assigned determine what a person is able to do and what they are able to access in the system. This process is referred to as *Entity Management*.
- There are training materials available to help guide the assignment of roles in the system.

Next Steps in Grant Management:

2. Work with OJDP to clear your budget

- Awards come with a “conditional budget clearance,” which means that our finance office still needs to review your budget and provide a “final clearance memo.”
- Financial reviews that result in requests for additional information will come to you in the form of a Grant Award Modification in JustGrants.
- You can find directions on exactly how to respond to the request for budget edits in pgs. 25-36 (Web-Based Budgets); 48-55 (Attachments for Budget Detail Worksheets e.g. excel). The directions contain helpful screenshots.
- If no additional information is needed, a financial clearance will be issued.
- Should be completed **as soon as possible**.

Conditional Budget Clearance Award Condition

The recipient's budget (and budget narrative) is pending clearance by OJP.

Prior to budget clearance (and unless there is a more restrictive condition on this award, in which case the terms of that more restrictive condition apply): The recipient may not drawdown more than 10% of the award. Pre-clearance obligations, expenditures, and drawdowns may be disallowed if not in compliance with program requirements.

The recipient should be judicious in using award funds prior to budget clearance. Generally, OJP expects that recipients (depending on the specific project scope) may need to advertise for award-funded positions, pay personnel and fringe benefits for positions budgeted under the award, plan for project activities, attend training and pay training-related travel needed to begin the project, and engage in other limited activities conducted by recipient staff (i.e., generally not requiring a subaward or procurement contract under an award).

OJP will issue an Award Condition Modification upon budget clearance.

Categories

- **Personnel** - Position & Titles, and percentage of time on award
- **Fringe Benefits** - Examples: FICA, health, retirement, etc.
- **Travel** - Number of travelers, Per Diem Rates, Description/Purpose of travel
- **Equipment** - Unit & cost, Purpose
- **Supplies** - Major types & Project Benefits
- **Construction** - Typically Unallowable; speak with Grants Manager
- **Subawards** (subgrants) - Organization Name and Scope of Work
- **Procurement Contracts** - Consultant rates (\$650/day threshold); Sole Source (over \$250K)
- **Other Costs** - Major types & Basis
- **Indirect Cost** - Approved Rates, Current Negotiated Agreement, and De Minimis rate (No more than 15%)

- **Procurement Contracts** - Ms. Mariah Carey \$535/day
- **Other Costs** - Rent 1200 sq ft @ \$22 per sq ft
- **Indirect Cost** - De Minimis rate (No more than 15%)

CTAS: Top 10 Reasons Budgets Are Rejected

- The budget detail worksheet is missing
- The budget detail worksheet computations are incorrect
- Unallowable costs are included in the detail budget worksheet
- Required cost breakdown by categories has not been included
- Incomplete budget narrative
- Financial Management and Internal Control Questionnaire form (FMICQ) has not been submitted (all OJP applicants)
- Prior budget did not clear (applies to supplemental awards)
- A current Federally approved indirect cost rate negotiated agreement has not been submitted (Withholding can be applied)
- Responses to the initial budget financial review memo were insufficient

Next Steps in Grant Management:

3. Gather the team that will be working on this program

- This could include grant management staff, program staff, key partners, and the financial point of contact that will be working on your grant.
- Provide copies of the Award Package and grant award application that was funded to your team so that you can review what was awarded and begin to consider any significant changes that may have occurred since the proposal was submitted.
- The team may also want to review performance measures, reporting requirements, and establish regular team check-ins.
- If you have new team members that were not able to attend today's orientation, ask them to watch this recording.

Next Steps in Grant Management:

4. Be aware of the Award Condition on your award that requires financial management training

Both the Grant Award Administrator and all Financial Managers for this award must have successfully completed an "OJP financial management and grant administration training" by 120 days after the date of the recipient's acceptance of the award. Successful completion of such a training on or after October 15, 2020, will satisfy this condition. Training certificates are valid for three years.

A list of OJP trainings that OJP will consider "OJP financial management and grant administration training" for purposes of this condition is available at <https://www.ojp.gov/training/fmts.htm> . OCFO is also scheduling an in-person training April 14-16th. If you'd like to register in-person, please email DOJFinancialTraining@ojp.usdoj.gov. All trainings that satisfy this condition include a session on grant fraud prevention and detection.
